Russian Autocracy Redux:

Path Dependency and the Late Modern State



James W. Warhola (Ph.D. 1983, The Ohio State University, in Political Science) is Professor of Political Science at the University of Maine, where he teaches a wide array of courses on international politics and the history of political thought. He has published widely in the areas of Russian political affairs, Turkish political affairs, politics and religion in comparative perspective, and politics and ethnicity in comparative perspective. He has been an invited speaker at professional functions in numerous national and international venues, including Moscow Russia, Ankara Turkey, Vienna Austria, Bratislava Slovakia, Oxford University UK, and others. In the Spring semester 2010 he was Visiting Research Fellow at Bilkent University, Ankara Turkey; he previously held similar positions at Moscow State University in Russia, Emory University, Florida State University, and Baylor University. Dr. Warhola has research capability in Russian, Turkish, German, Spanish, and several other languages. He serves on the Editorial Council of the Journal of Church and State. He has served as Vice-President of the Faculty Senate and is currently Chairman of the Department of Political Science at the University of Maine. In 2002 Dr. Warhola was named Distinguished Maine Professor, the highest academic distinction awarded by the University of Maine.
