**Gleb Tsipursky** is an Assistant Professor of History at The Ohio State University. His research interests focus on the Soviet Union, especially on socialist modernity, youth, popular culture, consumption, emotions, the Cold War, globalization, social control, policing, and violence. His publications have appeared in the United States, France, Germany, Canada, England, and Russia. Currently, he is writing a full-length monograph on Soviet youth and popular culture during the Cold War, entitled "Socialist Fun: Youth, Consumption, and Popular Culture in the Cold War Soviet Union, 1945–1970." His next planned project is a new study on volunteer militias and youth violence in the Soviet Union and in post-Soviet Russia.
